	"Hail, Lord of the Earth, Invincible, Power, Glory, Honor, Blessed, Great, Worthy art Thou to inherit the kingdom."
	Ancient inscription in praise of the emperor
2	The Persecution of Emperor Nero, AD 64
2	A great fire burned most of Rome.
	- Nero likely started the fire.
	- He blamed Christians to deflect popular anger from himself.
	– Many Christians were arrested and killed.
3	
	This was the first major persecution of Christians by Romans.
	It was typical of early persecutions in three ways.
	– Temporary
	– Local
	 Fueled by the hostility of pagans for Christians
4	The Problem of Emperor Worship
	• The Roman government tolerated the religions of its conquered peoples as long as the emperor was worshipped.
	– "Always room for one more" in a polytheistic system.
	 Emperor worship was a way of promoting loyalty to the emperor and unity under him.
5	
	Judaism was the only religion exempted from emperor worship.
	 At first, Christians were considered Jews, and also exempted.
	 Christians soon lost this exemption.
	It became clear that they were distinct from Jews.
	 Jews were a closed group of limited size, while Christians sought converts and grew in numbers rapidly.
	 A fast-growing group refusing to worship the emperor seemed threatening.
6	
	Christians' refusal to worship the emperor resulted in severe, though sporadic, persecution.

– Much of the Book of Revelation may be interpreted as describing the conflict

between Christians and the satanic pride of the emperor.

Christians would not compromise on this point.
 The emperor's claims were blasphemous.

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
